

Participation du CEPED au congrès du GIS Asie

Le GIS Etudes asiatiques (GIS Asie) organise son **6ème Congrès International** qui se tiendra du **lundi 26 juin 2017 au mercredi 28 juin 2017** dans les locaux de Sciences Po Paris (Sciences Po), 27, rue Saint Guillaume 75007 Paris.

The 6th French Network for Asian Studies International Conference (FNASIC) (26-28 June 2017) is organized by the French Network for Asian Studies – FNAS (GIS Asie in French) – together with Sciences Po, Paris.

Le congrès est un lieu de rencontres entre chercheurs de différentes disciplines, qui travaillent sur des aires culturelles distinctes dans la région Asie Pacifique, ou encore entre chercheurs français et étrangers, entre jeunes chercheurs et chercheurs confirmés. Pour l'édition de 2017, un millier de participants sont attendus.

Le programme se compose de sessions plénières ou semi-plénières– conférences, tables rondes – ainsi que de sessions parallèles – ateliers autour de résultats de recherche récent ou de présentations d'ouvrages et/ou revues récemment parus. Près de 170 sessions d'ateliers sont programmées, où toutes les disciplines des sciences humaines et sociales sont représentées (histoire, géographie, anthropologie, linguistique, sociologie, économie, droit, sciences politiques etc.). Les ateliers sont regroupés en une quinzaine de parcours thématiques, notamment sur l'aménagement du territoire, les migrations, les questions de genre.

Les membres du CEPED participent à 4 panels et coordonnent 3 d'entre eux:

1/ Panel: Sexuality, intimacy and medicine in Asia - Coord. Aline Henninger

Monday, June 26, 14:00 - 15:30 (1h30)

This panel aims to demonstrate the complex links between sexuality, intimacy and medicine in Asia (India, Vietnam, Cambodia, China, South Korea and Japan), in a context of urbanization, globalization and fast social changes, in which people's perception of their own body has strongly evolved. This panel will focus on the various representations of people intimacy, especially through the analysis of medical practices. This panel aims to understand how gendered social roles are influencing health problems and how intimacy and sexuality are dependent from health systems. It will especially focus on the way gender is shaping sexual and reproductive health issues, in gendered social and professional context and gendered care system. The authors of this panel will examine the current situation in the designed countries, by analyzing recent fieldwork data.

2/ Panel: The territories of waste collection in Hanoi: urban expansion, informal sector dynamics and actors vulnerability - Coord. Sylvie Fanchette

Urban environment is becoming a burning issue in the context of the metropolization and the policy of beautification and modernization of the capital city, Hanoi. This panel discusses the three times of the process of recomposition of the territories of the informal waste collection in the city of Hanoi since the open-door policy in 1986 with a focus on the new context of globalization. We will combine several perspectives (longitudinal, spatial, social and political) using the oriental and western approaches to offer new perspectives to understand the various aspects of the urban processes in Vietnam : the top-down policy of the state and the municipal authority and the bottom-up one through every day urban practices of migrants and inhabitants of the burgeoning urban villages. We will demonstrate how the booming informal economy of waste recovery (20% of the wastes collected in Hanoi) is territorially integrated in the city and rely on several conditions : the flexibility and fluidity of relationships between cities and country-side (migration, recycling of waste in craft villages and livestock villages, investment of urban remittance to the rural economy), the land vulnerability of waste receivers and junk buyer and the negotiations between the informal and formal actors and local authorities. We will try to analyze how the contradictions of the city's modernization policy contribute to the dynamism of this informal system that interferes in the shortcomings of territorial control.

3/ Panel: Digital Governance and Technological Imperialism: Some Reflections from South Asia

Digital objects have become a central matter of concern for international scholars with the growing importance of data collection, dataveillance mechanisms and data centered techno-political model of contemporary governance. This new nucleus of data relates with variety of factors which are shaped by their environment and sites of implementation; therefore they call for situated analysis and a specific attention to their particularities.

For this reason, we propose to revisit the notion of imperialism in the context of data driven models of governance in the Global South. Here site(s) makes an important point and place of analysis, since the very idea of differentiated technological development between global south and north, brings the importance of interlinked flows of humans, trends and technology. In this we need to reconcile the local sites and global trends which are linked through infrastructures, norms, uses, skills, objects and data. In order to do this, we mobilize two sets of conceptual and analytical tools: those offered by Science and Technology Studies on one hand, and those given by Postcolonial Studies on the other hand. The STS approach encourages to consider digital objects as socio-technical artifacts with politics; to deconstruct the materiality of objects, the methodologies that structure them, the human-objects relationships that shape them. The post-colonial approach put into question the North-focused approach which is dominant in the study of technology; it insists upon geopolitical power relations and inequalities, but also upon techno-cultural hybridization processes and it gives voice to actors that are usually invisibilized by dominant discourses. Combining these two approaches, we suggest that the notion of imperialism is relevant in the study of digital governance since it points that new technologies are part of long-term power relationships; at the same time we have to specify the peculiar forms under which imperialism unfolds.

Our argument is based upon different case studies related to digital governance in South Asia: mobile health projects, track & trace devices, identification politics, digital media strategies in India and Nepal.

4/ Panel: Public Health and Policy Transfer: Asia in a global perspective - Coord. Myriam De Loenzien

This panel aims at documenting the way international norms regarding public health are submitted to variations due to Southern countries' historicity. We take the examples of policies regarding HIV/AIDS prevention in Viet Nam, policies against sex imbalance at birth in South Korea, India and Viet Nam, promotion of Chinese medicine from China to the global world. We will document the extent to which these policies lead to dynamic and nonlinear processes regarding policy transfers. These policies will be analyzed and put in perspective with case studies from countries outside Asia, regarding abortion laws in Mexico and related practices, as well as HIV/AIDS policies in Cameroon and Senegal. This should help us to draw insights regarding the contribution of Asian countries to the study of processes regarding adopting, circumventing, subverting public health policies.
